Before the dance:

 Notify the Super Square Head, Stephanie Stevens, (408-871-9525) of any needed changes to assigned dates.

• On scheduled night, the designated Square Heads should arrive by **6:15** PM.and stay until clean up is finished around 9:45 PM. A Katydids member with a key will open the doors and will secure the hall at end of evening.

• Check the restrooms for supplies & tidiness.

• Make coffee (located on Katydids' shelf in the storage room) and ice water using provided plastic cubes stored in plastic ziplock bags in the freezer.

• Sweep the floor as necessary & set up the sign-in table.

• Bring out additional chairs from storage room as needed.

Set up drinks and supplies on counter.

 After the first tip, place snacks, located on the Katydids' shelf in the kitchen, on the back table at back of the hall along with paper goods, sanitizer and flyers

During Club dance:

• Welcome everyone as they enter.

A little something about OUR THEMES:

National Bouillabaisse Day (12-14-18), a day to celebrate a tasty Mediterranean fish stew or soup. Bouillabaisse is believed to have originated in Marseilles, France. It is extremely popular all around the Mediterranean, and is a specialty in ports across the region.

Day of Winter Solstice (12-21-18), the date of the winter solstice varies from year to year, and can fall anywhere between December 20 and December 23, with the 21st or 22nd being the most common dates. The reason for this is because the tropical year—the time it takes for the sun to return to the same spot relative to Earth—is different from the calendar year. The next solstice occurring on December 20 will not happen until 2080, and the next December 23 solstice will not occur until 2303.

The Pledge of Allegiance Day (12-28-18). The original version of the Pledge of Allegiance did not include the words "under God." The patriotic oath read: "I pledge allegiance to my flag and to the Republic for which it stands, one nation, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all." Congress added "Under God" to the Pledge in 1954 – during the Cold War. Many members of Congress reportedly wanted to emphasize the distinctions between the United States and the officially atheistic Soviet Union.

National Trivia Day (01-04-19). Here's a little-known fact: Jan. 4 is National Trivia Day! The trivia craze has been a part of popular culture for many decades. One of the first established systems for trivia debuted on the 1940s radio program "Take It Or Leave It" and not too long after Jeopardy!, arguably America's most iconic televised quiz show, appeared in 1964. As trivia started to gain momentum, Trivial Pursuit emerged in Montreal, Quebec, Canada in 1979 by two men named Chris Haney and Scott Abbott, which became one of the world's most famous board games. Since then, our love for obscure facts has taken the world by storm and a variety of trivia formats have found success across the world. While some people may find trivia 'trivial', it's the silly facts and the unique rules of the game that make it enjoyable for (almost) everyone.

PUMPKIN CHOCOLATE CHIP CAKE

1 pkg (about 15 oz) spice cake mix 1 can (15 oz) solid-pack pumpkin 2 eggs

1/3 c. water

1 c. semisweet chocolate chips

1 c. semisweet chocolate chips, melted (optional)

- 1. Preheat oven to 350°F. Grease and flour 12-cup (10-inch) bundt pan
- 2. Combine cake mix, pumpkin, eggs and water in large bowl; beat 2 to 2 minutes or until well blended. Stir in 1 cup chocolate cups. Pour batter into prepared pan.
- 3. Bake 35 to 40 minutes or until toothpick inserted near center comes out clean. Cool in pan 10 minutes; invert onto wire rack to cool completely.
- 4. Drizzle melted chocolate over cooled cake, if desired.

My friend, Carol wanted to celebrate her 80th birthday by crossing off one of her bucket list items -skydiving! She issued an invitation to any of her friends who wanted to join her, and I was the only one to take her up on it. We flew over Monterey Bay with "SkyDive Monterey" on a beautiful Friday afternoon, cheered on by a small group of friends and Carol's son. Chris, who had driven his van there with all of us packed within. She and I went through the flight pre-check, which included many legal papers to sign, and a lesson in getting into the harness and what to do in flight. Exiting the plane from 15,000 feet, we had over a minute of free-fall, and another 6-8 minutes of "floating under the parachute" time. The design of the parachute made the landing no harder than getting off a bus. Our tandem partners were extremely helpful in making it a safe and memorable experience—and they were very experienced with at least 3000 jumps each, After all, their lives were on the line too. It was beautiful up there, and not at all scary; in fact I think riding a roller coaster is much more scary than sky diving.

YIKES!! ABORT! ABORT!!

The Road Gypsies were at it again, this fall. I had a reunion of the International Voluntary Services Alumni Association (IVSAA) to attend in Newport, RI beginning Sunday, Oct. 28th and we decided to make it into a big cross-country van-camping trip so as to be able to see more of this great country of ours while at the same time seeing family and friends along the way. We knew it was late in the year so decided to travel quickly along a northern route and prayed that we would have reasonable weather.

We left San José a week later than originally planned on Wednesday, Oct. 3 and headed north to spend the night at Gualala Point Regional Park where we were surprised to find it raining when we got up in the morning. A light gentle rain. Lovely sounding on the roof of our van that had been transformed into a camper van for our road trip. While in town, we visited with a cousin of mine and soon delightedly discovered that she had some family photos that I had not seen before. I quickly dug my scanner out of the van to make copies of them. She also showed us some Iris Paper Folding cards that she makes and sells at the local craft shop.. Lovely. I had never heard of this type of paper-craft before.

From Gualala we headed north to Fort Bragg and then headed east on Route 20 through the beautiful forests to Willits. We did see some of the burn areas but not much. I think most of the damage was a bit further north in the Trinity Alps area. After traveling the northern edge of Clearlake we turned north at I-5 to head up to Portland where we visited friends who I had met when I was on an assignment with IVS in Laos in 1966-67. I taught English at the Teacher's College in the capital of Vientiane. One of my students owns a restaurant in Portland called Tara Thai and they serve Thai and Lao food. Of course, we had to go visit her. Unfortunately we learned that they will be closing the restaurant as soon as a buyer



be found. can Lavanne and her husband want to retire and their two daughters have no desire to take over the business. They started the restaurant many years ago and used it as a way to give Lao refugees a start in America. They provided quite a service to the Lao community by doing this.

In Seattle we visited with more family. We stayed one night with my niece's family. Ben, my niece's husband, got "stuck" fixing us breakfast and he was so cute ... he was so excited to share his Southern cultural heritage by cooking up some grits for us! We were soon back on the road and headed east to Boise and then on towards the west entrance to Yellowstone. Along the way it got colder and soon, as we went higher up in elevation, we started seeing snow on the ground. Almost immediately upon entering Yellowstone we came upon a herd of about seven elk grazing just in side the park. As we continued driving we saw a large group of bison in a valley and we also had the special pleasure of seeing a grizzly bear. fortunately, by the time we had our camera at the ready, he was rolling on his back with only his four paws visible in the tall meadow grass! At the East Entrance Visitor Center we saw this cute "snow bunny" greeting us from a park table!



We exited the Park and spent the night at a KOA campground in the quaint town of Greybull in Wyoming. We were one of only two campers present that night.In the morning we found that it had rained lightly overnight. It was cold but not as cold as the night before in Idaho Falls. We packed up our things and left Greybull and headed south to the town of Ten Sleep and continued east over a high mountain pass. It snowed and got quite treacherous. Unfortunately at one point we ended up facing the wrong direction having gone into quite a skid on the icy road and hit a guardrail. Skip did a marvelous job of keeping us on the road and not down a steep ravine. His Upstate

NY driving skills came in handy!! As we made a hard right turn to get on to I-90, we discovered that the bent front left bumper was scraping the

tire. We took it easy and continued on to the next town where we pulled in to a truck stop and located someone who could put a tow chain between the bumper hitch on his truck and the lower corner of the bent bumper. He used his truck to slowly pull against the bumper and then checked to see how it was doing and repeated until the bumper was clear of impinging on the tire. After ascertaining that there was no further serious damage to the van, we resumed our travel through snow and near white-out conditions to the town of Sundance where we found a hotel for the night to wait out the weather. As we checked the van for our belongings that got tossed around in the upclose-and-personal look at the guardrail, we discovered that our 3-gallon water jug had tipped over and soaked most of our bedding.

Fortunately the hotel had a laundry room but the dryers weren't large enough for our quilt and sleeping bags. At Skip's suggestion I went to the desk and asked if it might be possible to use their commercial dryers. She said "yes" and even brought them back to the room all dry and folded. No charge except for LOTS of thanks!! That was indeed going above an beyond!!

We decided to stay one more night in Sundance and then decided . . . well, as the song goes "you gotta know when to hold 'em" -- did that in Sundance while waiting out the storm. and "you gotta know when to fold 'em" -- did that when we decided that ol' man winter was not something we wanted to deal with so early in our trip and left the next morning heading WEST on I-90 before heading south on I-25. It was a sunny day and except for getting out of Sundance, the pavement was dry. The high plains in snow was beautiful to look at. Came into coal country and saw a VERY long train pulling cars full of coal heading south, presumably to Cheyenne. One of the great moments of an otherwise emotionally gloomy day was getting a phone call from my granddaughter who had just passed her tests to get her driver's license.

We spent the night in Cheyenne and the next morning we headed west on I-80. Can't say there was much to look at; pretty boring if you ask me. Somewhere along the way, I got a phone call from a number I didn't recognize so I didn't pick up on it. Later when we pulled in for the night at a KOA in Salt Lake City, I noticed an email message from an address I didn't recognize. Skip also had a phone message on his phone. The messages asked if I was Stephanie. I was a little leery but the person had some pretty specific information about me, including that I square dance with the Katydids! So ... I called the number she gave me. Turns out she believes that she is my halfniece, the daughter of a woman she had located in 1990 while searching for her birth parents. Seems that both of them had been adopted and had each been

looking for their birth parents. It is a complicated story and appears to be legitimate. So, while I was in Salt Lake City (and NOT doing research at the Family History Center!), I discovered I have a half-sister (and her daughter and grand-children) that I never knew about. Wow! That's a head-turner!

The next morning, exactly two weeks after we started out on our journey, we got up early and headed home. It was a VERY long day, partly due to the length of the drive, and partly due to not one, but two multi-car pile ups just east of Sparks, Nevada. You should have seen Jackie, our Parson Jack Russell Terrier, race around the house when we finally got home. She was one happy pup!! (So were we . . .)

It took a few days after getting home to figure out just what to do about the Reunion in Rhode Island. We finally decided that I would fly and attend the meeting. I was to leave San José late on Saturday, Oct. 27th . . . just in time to see a nor-easter blow through the New England area ... thankfully, it arrived a few hours early and I missed the storm.

Several years ago when I attended a Reunion, I learned about the Bombies that had been dropped in Laos during the "secret" war and how the locals were frequently being killed or maimed by unexploded ordinance (UXO) as well as how the locals used the aluminum casings for many things. They are very



resourceful! This year I learned about the thousands of pounds of Agent Orange that had been dropped in the high country that borders





[editor's note: Ed Wayne, frequent guest at the Katydids Club on Friday nights sent this to me recently. I thought you might enjoy it as well.]

The year is 1918. "One hundred years ago." What a difference a century makes! Here are some statistics for the Year 1918:

- The average life expectancy for men was 47 years.
- Fuel for cars was sold in drug stores only.
- Only 14 percent of the homes had a bathtub.
- Only 8 percent of the homes had a telephone.
- The maximum speed limit in most cities was 10 mph.
- The tallest structure in the world was the Eiffel Tower.
- The average US wage in 1910 was 22 cents per hour.
- The average US worker made between \$200 and \$400 per year.
- A competent accountant could expect to earn \$2000 per year.
- A dentist \$2,500 per year
- A veterinarian between \$1,500 and \$4,000 per year.
- And, a mechanical engineer about \$5,000 per year.
- More than 95 percent of all births took place at home
- Ninety percent of all Doctors had NO COLLEGE EDUCATION!
- Instead, they attended so-called medical schools, many of which were condemned in the press AND the government as "substandard."
- Sugar cost four cents a pound.
- Eggs were fourteen cents a dozen.
- Coffee was fifteen cents a pound.
- Most women only washed their hair once a month, and used Borax, or egg yolks for shampoo.
