

#### Before the dance:

• Notify the Super Square Head, Stephanie Stevens, (408-871-9525) of any needed changes to assigned dates.

- On scheduled night, the designated Square Heads should arrive by 6:15 PM. and stay until clean up is finished around 9:45 PM. A Katydids member with a key will open the doors and will secure the hall at end of evening.
- Check the restrooms for supplies & tidiness.
- Make coffee (located on Katydids' shelf in the storage room) and ice water using provided plastic cubes stored in plastic ziplock bags in the freezer.
- Sweep the floor as necessary & set up the sign-in table.
- Bring out additional chairs from storage room as needed.
- Set up drinks and supplies on counter. Until the refrigerator is fixed, BRING ICE!!
- After the first tip, place snacks, located on the Katydids' shelf in the kitchen, on the back table at back of the hall along with paper goods, sanitizer and flyers

#### **During Club dance:**

- Welcome everyone as they enter.
- Collect a \$5.00 donation from each guest and have them sign in. "Regular" guests sign the prepared sheet, new guests sign the guest book.
- In the green box, there is an envelope with petty cash for making change.
- Offer raffle tickets: 5 tickets for \$1.00.
- In the green box, there are envelopes for keeping track of money collected during the evening.
- Divide the raffle proceeds with 50% to the Club, 50% to the winner. (Note: odd dollar goes to the winner!)
- Check that coffee, water & cups do not run out during the evening.



#### National Microtia Awareness Day (Nov. 9)...

This is a day for children and adults (and their families) who were born with Microtia and Atresia. Many schools across the nation will be participating and helping raise awareness with their students. Parents will be visiting classrooms, speaking about Microtia (underdeveloped or missing outer ears) and Atresia (hearing loss due to underdeveloped ear canals), and hearing devices to raise awareness. Hearing device and medical device companies also look forward to blogging on social media about Microtia and Atresia in hopes that everyone will learn a little bit about this congenital birth condition.

#### National Button Day (Nov. 16)...

National Button Day is observed annually on November 16. Founded in 1938, the <u>National Button</u> <u>Society</u> recognized button collecting as an organized hobby. Both novice and advanced button collectors celebrate the enjoyment collecting on this day.

#### Be A Misfit Day (Nov. 23)...

This is a repeat because of its popularity and not a NATIONAL that I am aware of. The closest this comes to in similarity would be the coming National Two Different Colored Shoes Day on May 3, 2019.

#### National Mousse Day (Nov. 30)...

National Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day (Dec. 7 Each year on December. 7, Pearl Harbor Survivors, veterans, and visitors from all over the world come together to honor and remember the 2,403 service members and civilians who were killed during the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. Further 1,178 people were injured in the attack, which permanently sank two U.S. Navy battleships (the USS *Arizona* and the USS *Utah*) and destroyed 188 aircraft. On Aug. 23, 1994, the United States Congress designated Dec. 7 as National Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day. Every year, remembrance events are held at World War II Valor in the Pacific National Monument, culminating in a commemoration ceremony on December. 7th.



# My Square Dance Trip to Germany & Austria

I had heard about a really fun square dancing trip to Germany from Jonie and Mike Murphy, so when I saw the flyer for the 2018 trip, I signed up right away! Tom Crisp organized the trip and he was a great caller, organizer and friend to everyone on the trip. I went with Val Paterson and Tami Bunnell and we all had a great time and danced our hearts out and walked everywhere! Our home base was in Grassau, Germany and over the 15 day trip, we enjoyed Oktoberfest in Munich and visited many beautiful castles and villages across Germany and Austria including Salzberg and Innsbruck.

Since the tour group was planning to meet up at the Munich Airport on September 19, I decided to leave a week earlier and spend time with my son and his wife, who live in Milan. We planned to drive to Munich from Milan, which is about 6 hours so we stopped at beautiful lake, called Lake Constance, for a few days.

At the airport, I met up with the group and buses were waiting to take us to Bavaria and our hotel in the quaint village of Grassau. At Hotel Sperrer, all 80 of us enjoyed dinner together and a drink. After dinner, we had a short evening of square dancing. Since it was a large group, some of us were in nearby apartments. Val and I were in an apartment, which was a 15 minute walk to the hotel, so we got our extra steps in! Our first day trip was to Amerang Farmers Museum where we saw farmhouses built centuries ago and learned how people lived back then.

One of the highlights of the trip was our visit to Salzburg, Austria, which is knowns as the "city of Mozart". We walked around town and saw several cathedrals and lots of sidewalk cafes. I was looking forward to the Mozart Dinner Concert planned for the evening. We were in a beautiful building called St. Peter's Abbey and had a lovely three-course meal accompanied by the Mozart Ensemble.

Each night, we had a square dance with our national callers, Tom Crisp, Jet Roberts and Joe Saltel and a few times we had dance groups from Germany join us. The German dancers were very good dancers and danced both the men and women's parts if needed.

The next big highlight was attending Munich's famous Oktoberfest, which is a 16 day festival that starts in mid September! We left early and drove about 1.5 hours to Munich in time to see the opening costume parade. The parade was wonderful and had lots of bands and dancers and people dressed in traditional folks costumes. They had huge beer tents along the parade route that were each the size of a football field! After a fun day at the festival, we were invited to join the Munich Dip 'n' Divers and Tamara Twirlers Round Dancers for their BBQ dinner and dance.





Next up on our itinerary was a boat ride on a beautiful called Lake Chiemsee that has several islands and castles to visit. We stopped at the Herrenchiemsee Island, which is home to one of King Ludwig's two castles. We had a guided tour of the castle and also visited the museum which had many beautifully decorated and ornate rooms. That night, the group walked to a fancy hotel near us called Hotel Wessnerhof and learned about how German Schnapps is produced.

The next day, we visited the most famous medieval castle in the world: Neuschwanstein Castle.




Once at the base of the castle, we took a horse-drawn carriage to the top of the hill to the entrance of the castle. What a view! And, it was interesting to read all about the history of King Ludwig II and his castles, which were never finished. Neuschwantein Castle is one of the most beautiful and well preserved castles in the world. It is also the inspiration for Walt Disney's Disneyland. It was ordered to be built by King Ludwig II and was intended as a personal refuge for the reclusive king. Sadly, he only lived in the castle for a short time and died mysteriously before it was finished. It was open to public after his death in 1886.

Our next adventure was to visit the famous and picturesque city of Innsbruck in Austria. This is such a beautiful city! We walked around and shopped and ate and enjoyed the sights and mountain views. The buildings all had such beautiful flower displays and our tour organizer, Tom Crisp told us they had a competition during the summer for the best floral displays! This city is famous for its ski resorts and it hosted the Winter Olympics twice. It's a wonderful place to visit and I recommend it highly. We also stopped at a tiny town near Innsbruck called Rattenberg am Inn, which is famous for Swarovski Crystal. That evening, we were hosted by a German Square Dance club called The Flying Dandelians for dinner and dance.



Back at the hotel, we enjoyed a performance by the Bavarian Traditional Schuhplatters. They danced in their traditional outfits and it was a joy to see young and older kids dance.

Our last trip was to the town of Berchtesgaden which houses the famous Salt Mines and Eagle's Nest. We visited the Obersalzber Salt Mines and changed into traditional miner's outfits and rode in a small and cramped open train car that went deep into the salt mountain. The mines have been in operation since 1517. The tour included several interesting displays of how the miners worked the mines years back. The fun part was experiencing the slides the miners took to get from one level to the next. Here's a group picture of all of us in our Salt Mines outfits!







The next part of the tour was to visit The Kehlsteinhaus, nicknamed "Eagle's Nest". Eagle's Nest was built as a present for Hitler's 50th Birthday in 1939. It sits high atop the Bavarian Alps and includes a lookout point, beer garden and a restaurant. After coming out of the Salt Mines, we walked into another tunnel and waited for the elevator to take us up to the top. The remnants of homes of former Nazi leaders such as Adolf hitler, Hermann Goring and Martin Bormann were all demolished in the early postwar years. The only remaining full intact buildings are the former SS HQ at Hotel Zum Turken, Albert Sper's house and the Kehlsteinhous.

After another busy day of sightseeing, we drove back to our hotel for a dinner and more square dancing! The last day was free time to pack and last minute shopping. It was a wonderful trip!
